I hope this finds you all rested and refreshed after the holidays and ready for Term 3. Term 2 was a busy time for all and WAVE staff were involved in a number of initiatives that were outstanding successes.

The SneezeSafe programme was delivered by Public Health Nurses and supported by WAVE facilitators in approximately 145 classes in many primary schools and 4 Early Childhood Education settings during the first two weeks of Term 2. Evaluation of this initiative was extremely positive and planning for 2015 will take place soon.

WAVE, in conjunction with Komene Kururangi, has facilitated four Māori Development Workshops in June and also a Traditional Māori Games Workshop. Attendance at these workshops has been outstanding with over 70 educators attending one session. Presently WAVE facilitators are delivering the resource booklets that Komene has developed so if you have not received yours please let your facilitator know. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Komene for the fabulous work he has been delivering. Your feedback has highlighted what a great job you also think he does. Additionally I would like to thank the WAVE facilitators involved for their time and efforts and especially for the provision of the afternoon tea!

There have been some changes to the WAVE team in recent months – firstly I would like to welcome Heather Allington to the team as our Nutrition Health Promoter. She has joined us from Wellington and is enjoying the crispness of our winter!

Secondly I would like to congratulate Felicity on her appointment to the role of Aukati Kaipaipa Smoking Cessation Practitioner; the good news is she will still be located in our office. Unfortunately this means she will leave her role as WAVE administrator, however we hope to have this vacancy filled soon. Felicity will be a real asset within this role and we know her energy and ideas will be a bonus for education settings.

Our tress will be planted on our new site when our Playcentre moves premises.



### Timaru Girls High School

### Timaru Girls High School Bus Shelter Initiative

The TGHS WAVE Team is currently working on building two bus shelters at TGHS, this is for students to shelter from the inclement weather while waiting for buses to arrive at their school. This initiative has arisen from a well-being survey the WAVE Team facilitated at the start of the school year.

The girls are working through the process with the Timaru District Council (TDC) of making sure the shelters are compliant with TDC regulations. Members of the WAVE Team visited the council recently to find out what is required; this involved meeting with town planners, a transportation engineer and a building advisor. The WAVE Team has also discussed the bus shelters with the TGHS caretaker and is currently seeking permission from the school BOT and the Ministry of Education for approval of the shelters.

Two Year 12 students have studied the subject of building a bus shelter for the school as part of their health class – the students have now finished their assignment and the school will be using that information to build the shelters. ITM Timaru has offered to supply the materials for the shelters, with building of the shelters undertaken by parents, students and the wider community.

The proposed bus shelters are to be on Hassall St and Cain St. WAVE will have updates on the progress of the bus shelters in future WAVE newsletters.

## **SneezeSafe®**

During the first two weeks of Term 2 the Public Health Nurses and WAVE facilitators were busy delivering the Kleenex SneezeSafe lesson in primary schools and Early Childhood Education settings. A decade on, the SneezeSafe® lesson is a fixture in many schools Term 2 calendars. It is widely backed by health professionals, embraced by teachers, applauded by Public Health Nurses and enjoyed by children, but this is believed to be the first time in ten years a joint District Health Board (DHB) team has mobilised a whole community in this way. Dr Jennings, Clinical Virologist and Clinical Associate Professor at Canterbury Health Laboratories (Canterbury DHB) has championed the SneezeSafe® lesson world-wide, congratulated the team in Timaru for organising this community-wide initiative.

The Public Health Nurses delivered the SneezeSafe® lesson to over 145 classrooms and covered all age groups, although predominantly Year 1 to Year 4 classes. Alongside delivery of the SneezeSafe® lesson WAVE facilitators were either on hand to present certificates, letters to take home, posters and stickers or made sure classes received allocations of same. The SneezeSafe® kits, to support the lesson plan, included black lights with glo germ gel, water mist squirty bottles, glitter and bubbles to illustrate the spread of a sneeze and the importance of good hand washing.

Additionally SneezeSafe® was trialled in four Early Childhood Centres and although some modification for age appropriateness was required, also reported a very positive experience for all.

Teaching staff were asked to complete an evaluation at the time of the SneezeSafe® lesson and another two weeks later, and it was great to receive 73 initial responses and 60 follow up responses.

Evaluation showed overwhelming support for the delivery of the SneezeSafe® lesson and the role of the Public Health Nurses and WAVE Facilitators. Feedback with regard to the Public Health Nurses delivery, the timing of delivery and the impact of the lesson was overwhelmingly positive with 59/60 reporting their agreement that the SneezeSafe® lesson has meant students have a greater awareness of the need for sneezing safely. 57/60 respondents agreed they would recommend the SneezeSafe® lesson to other teachers and 54/60 agreed SneezeSafe® has resulted in notable improvement in respiratory hygiene in students.

Overall SneezeSafe® was an outstanding success and WAVE would like to thank the Public Health Nurses who managed to fit this into, already, busy schedules and also to the settings for their support.

### The 4.30 show: SneezeSafe® @ Gleniti School

When the 4:30 show knocked at the door at about 11:30 on the last day of Term 1, we were all nervous. We were going to be on TV! There was a cameraman, a producer and the presenter, Eve. We were told what to do, how to react and where the camera was going to be. We then all sat down looking and listening to Mrs Laming our teacher. We started the SneezeSafe® lesson, learning all about things like how far a sneeze could go, (it can go as far as a metre), how long viruses can survive outside the body (7 days!), and how to keep yourself safe from the nasty bugs.



There are three ways to sneeze safely:

- 1. Sneeze into your elbow.
- 2. Sneeze into your hand, then wash it!
- 3. Sneeze in a tissue then bin it. This is the best option of the three.

The motto is: Trap it, Bin it, Wash it!

It was very hard to concentrate with the camera going, moving around, and having to do the same shots over and over. The camera crew was very nice to us and so was Eve. It took us two whole hours to make the SneezeSafe® video. It was a really cool experience to see how TV is made, it's really hard work! Everyone who watched the 4:30 show should now know how to sneeze safe!

## Māori Language Week - Language is a Taonga

## 21-27 July 2014

CELEBRATING our national treasure is all part of "Whakanuia Te Wiki o te Reo Māori 2014" (Celebrate Māori Language Week 2014)

Māori Language is our taonga (treasure). Our language is our taonga to all and although there has been a loss of the language to quite a few generations, there has been a huge revival of it.

For tangata whenua, your culture, your land, where you were born, your whakapapa (genealogy), and your language were very important. If you lose these too, you lose your identity, your culture. Knowing your language is part of your identity and gives you a sense of uniqueness. "If you know your identity, you know where you stand and who you are."

This year "Whakanuia Te Wiki o te Reo Māori 2014" will explore and celebrate 'Te Kupu o te Wiki', which translates as "The Word of the Week."

Under this theme, a new Māori word will be highlighted each week for fifty weeks. All schools, communities and organisations are encouraged to introduce and adopt that word with students and staff etc.

"Te Kupu o te Wiki" will help New Zealanders to build their Māori vocabulary. Through Te Kupu o te Wiki, Māori language lovers can learn Māori words to use in everyday conversation. To learn more about Te Wiki o te Reo Māori and receive resources visit www.koreromaori.co.nz

WAVE recently held a Sustainable Edible Gardening Workshop. Participants were keen to discuss and explore ways to encourage edible gardening and how to maintain healthy gardens into the future.

Participants had an opportunity to network with others, share resources, and brainstorm possible solutions to challenges. Everyone took away a new booklet titled "guidelines, tips and suggestions to ensure - Sustainable Edible Gardens in education settings", and two posters - "Challenges and Solutions", "Linking your Garden with the Curriculum"

As a result of feedback WAVE will be emailing a monthly gardening newsletter which is hoped will encourage connections, plant swapping, sharing ideas and linking the garden with the curriculum.





## **WAVE Professional Development**

### Traditional Māori Games

On the 13th of June there was a Traditional Māori Games (TMG) Workshop for sports teachers and physical education teachers across the primary, secondary and tertiary sectors. The purpose of the workshop was to further develop TMG and Ki O Rahi in the South Canterbury region. This is a follow on from the secondary school TMG Professional Development (PD) from 2012 which was also part of the WAVE PD series.

The workshop covered a number of games including stick (Rakau, long and short) and group games such as Ki O Rahi, hand games such as Hei Tama Tu Tamá and Hipitoitoi and a board game called Mu Torere. The workshop was facilitated by Komene Kururangi and Physical Activity Health Promoter, Greg Newton.

## Maori Professional Development

Over the past few weeks the WAVE Team provided (and ran by Komene Kururangi) Māori Beginners Guide to Māori Professional Development (PD) for settings. The sessions were run in Fairle, Timaru and Waimate, with 181 teaching staff from 48 different settings the PD proved to be very popular.

Discussion points were:

- Having an open forum where settings could ask questions without feeling like they are offending anyone
- Local Customs and Tikanga
- Giving guidance to settings on how to engage with their local Marae and their local Māori Community
- A resource booklet is also going to be given to all participants



### Youth Week

A high standard of creativity was evident at this year's Youth Week Art Competition & Exhibition held recently at the Timaru District Council Mayoral Chambers. The Exhibition Opening & Awards night was a real youth affair with young people involved in both hosting the evening and providing some great entertainment.

The key aim of the Youth Art Project is to make art accessible for all young people and is organised by Youth Alley in partnership with WAVE. Young people who attend education settings outside mainstream schools are provided with an opportunity to get creative through a series of art workshops. The workshops are resourced through the generosity of our funders & sponsors and are delivered by a group of recognised local artists who help young people to explore concepts and express ideas through visual art. The workshops culminate in an Art Exhibition complete with an Opening and Awards night. This year's event included a new category sponsored by Te Rito and awarded to the work that best reflects positive family/whānau relationships.

Exposure to creative arts promotes positive and productive neurological functioning with research showing improvements in concentration, calmness, confidence, mood regulation and the ability to direct or focus attention. For many young people the workshops have been their first opportunity to explore creative arts under the guidance of a professional artist. Success here can open up new and interesting career pathways.






